

Judge Roy Moore's Art. III, Sec. 2 legislation in US Congress to limit jurisdiction of US Supreme Court and other federal courts:

HR 3799 - Constitution Restoration Act of 2004

S.2323 - Constitution Restoration Act of 2004

This legislation seeks to invoke the constitutional authority given to the US Congress in the US Constitution by the Founding Fathers in 1787, **to limit the jurisdiction of the US Supreme Court (and the other federal courts) as Congress is authorized to do, IAW Article III., Section 2. of the US Constitution.**

US House Bill H.R. 3799 and US Senate Bill S. 2323 are almost identical companion bills. These bills focus on removing appellate jurisdiction from the US Supreme Court and both original and appellate jurisdiction of the lower federal courts (which were created by statute by Congress in the Judiciary Act of 1789) in matters involving **"ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF GOD AS THE SOVEREIGN SOURCE OF LAW, LIBERTY, OR GOVERNMENT."**

This is one of the most important pieces of legislation to be introduced into Congress in history of the United States of America. It would stop the judicial tyranny of the federal courts seeking to eradicate America's Christian heritage from the landscape of the public domain, seen in the attacks on public display of the Ten Commandments and on public Christian prayer, whether by government officials or private citizens.
